

HOW do we do this?


- Learning Dispositions (*Characteristics or attitudes to learning*)

Here's a quick update from your Board of Trustees

Bottom Block Refurbishment Update:

Although initially penciled in for Term 3, our Bottom block refurbishment has been delayed due to various compliance issues. We are happy to report that things are progressing and we hope to have multiple tenders for the work very soon. As an added bonus, we are very grateful to have been granted funds from Pelorus Trust and Trust House for two cookware sets, two induction ovens and two rangehoods, which will be used for food technology learning in this new space.

We'll keep you updated on progress.

Creating a Health and Safety Culture at HHS:

Health and Safety is a priority for the Board of Trustees, to ensure that our tamariki, staff and visitors are all looked after, physically, mentally and emotionally. We are beginning to see the culture of Health and Safety growing and we encourage students and whanau to take an active role in helping build a culture where we're all keeping each other safe at school. If you see anything that you think needs to be brought to the school's attention with regards to health and safety, please do not hesitate to mention it to school leadership or a Board member. If we're all playing an active role in this, we're all doing our part in keeping each other safe and well.

Pasifika Whanau and Te Aka Whanau groups:

The establishment of our new Pasifika group has been a wonderful addition to the work we have been doing with our already established Māori reference group, now known as Te Aka Whānau. Both the Pasifika and Te Aka Whānau groups have given us wonderful insight and ideas on how we can improve our school to ensure that our Māori and Pasifika children (and subsequently, ALL of our children) can improve their academic and social success at school. We're continuing to work on creating more groups that can help us in the way we shape our school and would love to have you involved if you would like to contribute. Finally, a big thanks from the Board to everyone for cooperating with the school closure during the recent stop-work day. **We understand that this might have been an inconvenience for you, and we're grateful to you all for making alternative arrangements on that day.**

Information for parents and local school community Influenza outbreaks in schools in the greater Wellington region

Several schools and early child education centres in the Wellington region currently have an influenza outbreak.

The main symptoms of influenza are fever, cough and sometimes vomiting or diarrhoea in younger children. These symptoms usually last 3-4 days but can be up to 7 days.

The following information will help reduce the spread of influenza and assist your school:

1. Advise a member of staff if your child has an illness as described above.
2. Check that your school has your correct and up-to-date contact details in case they need to contact you.
3. Keep sick children at home until feeling well and free from symptoms (usually 3-4 days but up to 7 days). Sick staff and students should not be at social or sporting events, school productions or camps. This is so they can rest and recover and don't spread illness to others.
4. It is important to use tissues to cover coughs and sneezes and to be very good about washing and drying hands thoroughly. An [influenza brochure](http://www.rph.org.nz/influenza) accessible at www.rph.org.nz/influenza has some good tips for looking after people with influenza and stopping it spreading to other people at home.
5. If anyone in your family has influenza we ask that they don't visit hospitals or community care homes or see people who may be at high risk of serious illness, such as pregnant women, young babies, or anyone who has cancer, lung, and heart or kidney conditions.



If you are worried about your child's symptoms or they have long-term health problems (e.g. asthma, diabetes, kidney, heart or immunity problems), then you should phone their usual doctor or Healthline 0800 611 116 for further advice. Otherwise they should recover at home and see their GP only if the illness gets worse or is not improving.

How to take part


We are holding three wānanga on the future of Māori education in the Wellington region:

Tēnei rā Te Tihuhu o te Mānūrangā ka pōwhiri i ngā whānau, hapū, iwi o te motu - tamariki māi, mātua māi, kaumātua māi hoki - ki te āwhina i ngā mahi hei hanga i te anamata o ngā mahi whakaako Māori ki Aotearoa nei.

Kei te hiahia te Kāwanatanga kia aro te pūnaha mātauranga ki te angitū o ngā ākonga katoa. Tāe atu ki ngā ākonga Māori. Hei āwhina i tēnei mahi, kei te pirangi mātau kia tuku mai koe i ō whakaaro mō te mātauranga ki a mātau, kia kōrerotia hoki ki waenga i a koutou.

Ākuanui pea ka whai wāhi koe ki te kura kōhungahunga, ki te kōhanga reo rānei. He ākonga pea koe, he kaiako rānei. Kei tētahi Kura Māori pea, kei tētahi kura aurangi rānei. Kei tētahi wānanga, kei tētahi kura tuatoru rānei. He matua pea koe, he kaumātua rānei. He kaiwhakawhiwhi mahi rānei. Hei ahakoa. Ko te mea nui kē, kei te pirangi mātau ki te rongo kōrero i a koe.

Kei te pirangi mātau ki te mōhio he aha ngā mea nui ki a Ngāi Māori i ngā mahi mātauranga; he aha ngā āhuatanga kei te uaratia, he aha ngā āhuatanga me whakarerekē, ā, me pēhea hoki te whakarerekē e eke ai a Ngāi Māori ki ngā tino taumata o te mātauranga, o te whai mahi, o te ao hoki.


